Mark Malcolm, Pulaski County Coroner

Pulaski County Coroner to speak on Mass Fatality Program and Nursing Home Investigations at November 12th Meeting.

In June 2007 Mark Malcolm was appointed to the FEMA National Advisory Council created by Congress to provide advice and guidance on all aspects of preparedness and emergency management. He was named Director of Mass Fatality for the Arkansas Department of Health and sits on a National committee that is responsible for developing a mass fatality training module for use in all 50 states.

Mr. Malcolm served as Director of Field Operations for International Emergency Services during the search and recovery of those who died following Hurricane Katrina and also served as Director of Morgue Operations in Phuket, Thailand following the December 2004 tsunami.

Mark Malcolm was appointed Pulaski Coroner in 1995 and is the only full-time coroner in Arkansas. He has worked tirelessly to help improve the care of residents in nursing homes. In March of 2002 he appeared before the United States Committee on Aging and provided testimony regarding the Arkansas law he authored mandating the reporting of all nursing home deaths to the county coroner.

Mr. Malcolm holds Fellow status with the American Board of Medicolegal Death Investigation at the St. Louis University School of Medicine and is one of only one hundred ten board certified death investigators in the United States. He serves as an instructor at the University of Arkansas Criminal Justice Institute and the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences.



From the President's Desk

I recently participated in the Alzheimer's Arkansas Walk in Conway. I was proud to be part of a group that raised roughly \$23,000 for research, seeking a cure for this disease. While at this rally I was reminded that Alzheimer's Arkansas disaffiliated from the national organization in 2002 because consolidation of offices would have meant moving to another state. Alzheimer's Arkansas chose to keep their offices in Little Rock and provide information and support for the people of Arkansas.

Some key facts about Alzheimer's disease:

- >Almost 5 million Americans have Alzheimer's disease.
- ≥100.952 Arkansans have Alzheimer's disease.
- >By the year 2050 an estimated 14 million will have the disease.
- >Alzheimer's disease affects 10% of people over 65 and 50% of those over 85.
- >Alzheimer's is the 4th leading cause of death of persons 65 and older.
- >Alzheimer's is the leading cause of dementia.
- >Almost one-half of nursing home patients have dementia.
- >Most Alzheimer's patients are cared for at home by a spouse or adult child.

- >In-service training for professional caregivers

A recent article on weapons against Alzheimer's mentioned a new drug, Memantine, released in January 2004 to fight the disease. It attacks the disease differently than the existing drugs, Aricept, Reminyl and Exelon. The good news is that when dual therapy is used, the new Memantine with one of the older drugs, the likelihood of successful treatment is improved. Studies have shown improved cognitive performance along with improved mood and decreased incidence of depression. However, Memantine had been approved only for the treatment of moderate-to-severe Alzheimer's disease. Assessment of this drug will continue and it is pointed out that it is not a "wonder drug"; it is not a cure. It is just one step closer to improving the lives of millions of Alzheimer's patients.

When each of us takes steps in the annual "WALK" the cure will come.

Hospice Care Can Supplement Nursing Home Care

Attendees at the October 8 AANHR meeting heard Dena Carr, Director of Community Outreach of Arkansas Hospice, Inc. speak about hospice care and how it can supplement care in the nursing home.

Hospice provides comfortable, compassionate care for patients and family when medical cure of an illness is no longer possible. In the words of Dr. Cecily Saunders, founder of the modern hospice movement, "You matter to the last moment of your life, and we will do all that we can, not only to help you die peacefully, but also to let you live until you die."

Hospice care can be given to nursing home residents exactly the same as if they were living in their own home; the nursing home staff stands in for the family caregiver. Hospice does not replace the basic nursing home care but provides extra care to provide physical and emotional comfort.

Hospice care is funded by Medicare and insurance but is provided to anyone with a terminal illness regardless of ability to pay for the service. It will not, however, pay for basic nursing home costs. It is provided to anyone of any age; you do not have to be over 65. It is available for any diagnosis. Fifty-four percent of hospice patients do NOT have cancer.

Patients do not have to sign a "Do Not Resuscitate" directive to receive hospice and can continue to receive aggressive treatment for conditions other than the diagnosis for which they are receiving hospice care. For example, a cancer patient may be hospitalized for treatment of pneumonia.


Services available from hospice over and above basic nursing home include:

- * Oversight by an RN weekly and on call 24/7 when there is a change in condition.
- * Comfort care and medications by a physician skilled in pain management
- * All medications related to the terminal diagnosis, medications needed for pain, and equipment needed for comfort.
- * Extra bathing and personal care
- * Regular visits from trained volunteers
- * Spiritual care from a specially trained chaplain as requested or needed
- * Services of a social worker 24 hours a day.
- * Bereavement services for loved ones for one year following the death.

Anyone may request an initial consultation. A doctor's order is NOT necessary for an informational visit. Such a visit may be provided at a time and place convenient to the family. There are many hospice agencies in Arkansas, four in Little Rock alone, so patients have a choice. However, the nursing home may have a contract with a specific agency which may limit the choice in that home.



Rally for Residents' Rights

For the fourth consecutive year, National Residents' Rights Week was celebrated on the steps of the Arkansas Capitol building on October 1, 2007. Sponsored by AANHR and attended by approximately 50 advocates, ombudsmen, and media, it featured a proclamation by the governor recognizing the week and speeches by Arkansas Attorney General Dustin McDaniel, State Ombudsman Kathie Gately, AARP President Billieann Myers, and AANHR President Nancy Allison.

Centerpiece of the presentation was a tree completely covered with 54 silver bows. Each bow represented a nursing home that has been cited by the state Office of Long Term Care for actually causing harm to a resident during the past year. At this year's observance AANHR paid special recognition to volunteer ombudsmen and the work they do in representing nursing home residents and upholding their rights.



CORRECTION:

In AANHR's October Newsletter Article entitled "20 Common Nursing Home Problems and How to Resolve Them" the length of time that a nursing home must keep a bed available for residents who have been hospitalized was incorrect. The important thing to remember is that the nursing home cannot arbitrarily use a resident's hospitalization as an excuse not to re-admit him. Residents and family members need to contact the Office of Long Term Care or an ombudsman to determine the rules that will apply in each specific case.

<u>Driving directions to</u> <u>First Assembly of God Church,</u> 4501 Burrow Road, North Little Rock

Coming from the North:

When driving South on Highway 67/167, take exit #1 onto Warden Road. As soon as you safely can, move into the right-hand lane, as you will be turning right at the Golden Corral Restaurant onto Commercial Drive.

Coming from East, West or South:

If you are on either I-30 or I-40, take Highway 67/167 North. Take exit #2 onto Landers Road. Stay in the left-hand lane, as you will be turning left and going under Highway 67/167 and enter Warden Road going southbound. As soon as you safely can, move into the right-hand lane, as you will be turning right at the Golden Corral Restaurant onto Commercial Drive.

Commercial Drive terminates at the church. Proceed straight across Burrow Road into the church's parking lot and turn right at the far side of the building into the narrow alley-like drive.

The entry door is located about half-way down this side of the church and the meeting room (#113) is immediately inside the entrance door.
